UNI is the place students don't get lost in the crowd and receive the support and challenges they need to succeed both in school and beyond.

How does UNI do all this? That's our job, the faculty. We are the ones who work with students day in and day out. We challenge them in our classes and spend the extra time for those who need it. We involve students in research, giving them the experience they need to land their first job or get into grad school. We are scholars who push the boundaries of our disciplines and share our knowledge freely. The structure and support provided by our administration and staff make things go, and they provide opportunities for us to succeed. But at the end of the day every class is like a one room schoolhouse where the success of every student depends on one single professor to do their job well.

Except for secretaries.. administrative assistants... whatever their title. One good secretary is worth 3 professors. I learned very early that the only thing between you and complete and total failure is a good secretary to make everything work out. Right now the outside world doesn't always look too friendly. Our board of regents asked for no increase to our funding from the state, aside from student financial aid. So the story sounds... not so good. Cuts to our budget mean cuts to our services and, eventually, cuts to our quality. Fortunately, I think I'm in a room full of smart people. Smart people who know how to solve problems. Smart people who know a thing about education. Smart people who know how to take

information, analyze it, and come up with solutions. Five years ago our university was facing similar budget problems, but we didn't have the leadership we do know and faculty weren't as aware as they are now. My department wasn't just on the cutting block, it was the only one that included the names of who was going to go. We could have sat back, watched it happen, let someone else make our case.

We decided not to do that. We fought with the best weapon at our disposal – education. Our union slowed things down and gave us the breathing room we needed to make our case. I still think our union is the reason we didn't end up in a spiral back to the Iowa Normal School. We used that time to tell our story. We didn't have to do it alone, either. Our graduates, our students, their families, and even a few companies joined in. Before long I think every politician in Iowa was getting hundreds of letters and emails telling them about how important our little program was and it worked. We didn't go low, we just told our story and it was good enough that I'm still here and so is our department.

Right now I think we are in a much better situation than five years ago. We have faculty that are aware and an administration that wants to work with us. We do important work that benefits all of Iowa, I think we just need to make sure we remind the people with the purse strings every once in a while. I hope we can work together to tell our story and get things back on track for our university and our students.

Thank you for all the hard work you do every day to make UNI a true comprehensive university with excellent teaching, scholarship, and outreach that has impact far beyond our classrooms.
